From participating in training sessions and coastal cleanups to hiking across national parks to plant native trees and install camera traps, many of you rolled up your sleeves and took action. In giving back to nature, you also gave to yourself, leaving recharged, inspired, and more deeply rooted in something bigger.

That connection – between people and planet – is also powering real science. Every time you tracked wildlife, monitored native trees, or surveyed a landscape, you added to a growing body of scientific research. Together, you've contributed **more than 100,000 data points**. This valuable data helps assess the state of natural ecosystems, supports global IUCN Red List efforts, and informs decision-making.

And in 2025 – **the UAE Year of Community** – you're driving the momentum forward. Each action and moment of support sends ripples of change across the UAE, reshaping the future of our shared environment.



YOU ARE REAL PEOPLE MAKING A REAL IMPACT

You are proving that a single morning spent in nature can spark ripples that last for months and years.

At Saadiyat Beach, one of the UAE's most beautiful and protected coastlines, mid-March to mid-June marks hawksbill turtle nesting season. Throughout these months, you gathered at dawn for **Turtle Patrols** – one of our most popular activities – scanning the sand for turtle tracks, new nests, and hatchlings.

For some, like **Nidhi Chimnani**, the Turtle Patrol will soon become an annual family tradition:

My son and I created wonderful new core memories at the Turtle Patrol.
We've added the hawksbill turtle nesting season to our family calendar and look forward to joining next year, with more friends and family members.






Each patrol is different – some reveal fresh turtle activity, others the stark reality of plastic pollution along our coasts.



Sisters **Reem and Natalya Kanj** shared their experience on Instagram with a powerful call to action:

We didn't find any sea turtles, but what we did find was a heartbreaking amount of nurdles... teeny tiny pellets of plastic.
These nurdles constitute the second most significant origin of microplastic debris discovered along coastlines.

We want to welcome you to take it upon yourselves to become collectors, the next time you're on the beach, take a glass jar with you and start filling it up.





For **Rohail Akbar**, a familiar face at Leaders of Change events, the patrols inspired a renewed commitment:

I'll be more conscious about my use of plastic products. My understanding of nurdles and how plastics end up on beaches has been deepened. I'll also be a lot more careful if I encounter a turtle nest, and learned that it is best to contact a specialized/authorized person if there is a need to handle or intervene with a nesting site.



For **Emilse Soriano**, learning about sea turtles left a lasting impression:

I tend to be conscious about the use of plastic. But today, learning how delicate and difficult it is for turtles – the job of reproducing and how important they are - I'll definitely make more effort and spread the word.



YOU ARE DOCUMENTING THE UAE'S WILDLIFE – ILDING A RECORD THAT INFORMS LOCAL

Through the City Nature Challenge, you joined a global citizen science movement that encourages people to explore their cities, document wildlife, and share their findings with the world.

For four days in Dubai, Leaders of Change and residents stepped outside, looked closer, and uncovered the rich urban biodiversity around us. **More than** 1,300 wild plants and animals were spotted, showcasing the UAE's unique biodiversity on a global stage. A special thanks to Terra, Expo City Dubai for bringing this inspiring initiative to the UAE.

explained Arabella Willing, The data collected has real-world impact, Head of Conservation Outreach & Citizen Science at Emirates Nature-WWF.

Initiatives like these inspire people to become scientists in their own communities, while the information gathered helps track species, assess habitats, and shape conservation strategies.

For many of you, that sense of purpose made the experience deeply rewarding. Desiree Balbon, who joined a Nature at Night event, reflected:

I joined the night activity at Al Marmoom Reserve and found it meaningful. We clearly contributed by helping researchers update the iNaturalist database and uploading observations for the ongoing competition.





YOUR STORY GOES GLOBAL!

Visitors from WWF offices across Asia Pacific joined a special Leaders of Change Nature at Night event during the AP25 Conference experiencing how we harness the power of community to drive change.

EMBARKING ON GREEN CAREERS

You served as citizen scientists, working alongside scientists to unveil the UAE's wild side. Through Camera Trap surveys, you categorized images of desert and mountain species – including the Dhofar toad, Feulner's semaphore gecko and bagworm moth – generating vital data to monitor populations and safeguard fragile habitats.

This quarter also marked the first Leaders of Change event at Ain Al Ghamour - a breathtaking site in Fujairah's rugged mountains. Together with the Fujairah Environmental Authority, you are helping study and protect its unique habitats.

These experiences often uncover a side of the UAE that few have noticed before. As **Tahir Mohammed** shared:

I am more aware about the wildlife that exists within the UAE and how to protect it after attending Emirates Nature-WWF's events... I didn't [realize] we had as much wildlife in the UAE.

They can also spark new ways to contribute beyond the field, as **Deepa** shared:

After participating in the Emirates Nature-WWF camera trap activity, I've become more aware of local wildlife and conservation needs. I plan to raise awareness through my photography, continue volunteering, and adopt more sustainable practices in daily life.



Often, these initial steps into conservation become pathways to green careers. After exploring different aspects of conservation through the Leaders of Change programme, **Iqtedar Ali** turned his passion for nature into a professional role at an environmental consultancy firm.
